PRIOR EVENTS

Tuesday September 6 - First Meeting of the New Gyro Year

The last bulletin said this meeting would be a business meeting but that has been rescheduled to Oct. 19. In its stead, information was sent out on August 31 about a Cornhole Game. Attendance was low due to conflicts but those in attendance had fun.

Thursday September 22 – Sunday 25th – District VIII Convention in Medicine Hat

This club last hosted a Gyro Convention in 2006 and we went all in on a joint District and International Convention with 400 persons attending. Paul Stout and Ian Greig steered it with an event at the zoo and a gala production of Chicago at the Westin Ballroom that Gyros still talk about. So, it was our turn to host again in 2020 and we choose Medicine Hat as a place that members would enjoy. Eventually, with the aid of vaccinations we targeted 2022 in the city with "All Hell for a Basement" (Rudyard Kipling).

At one point we had a registration for 90 persons but various illness and conditions up to the day of the event resulted in 76 persons attending – still a good turnout! The Medicine Hat Lodge allowed us to post large banners welcoming Gyros and they arrived Thursday for a Past District Governors meeting attended by 16 eligible members, followed by a poutine and burger buffet dinner and then a hospitality room in two adjoining suites run by Paul Stout and Brad Hinds - who then stayed in the rooms – good thing they were going stag that weekend. I counted 60 persons in the joined rooms that had seating for 14! Yes COVID was a possibility but in this case friendship had no bounds.

Early Friday morning after breakfast 18 golfers headed to a par 66 Cottonwood Executive course that turned out to be quite challenging with doglegs, tiered and sloped greens. When that was done our own **Karin Green took home the Ladies' Low Net Plaque** (she was so excited) and it was well deserved as she was smashing the ball. In addition, **John Cobb was awarded the Men's' Low Net Trophy** with a respectable 71. Thanks go to Garry Pattison for organizing this and coordinating Registrations.

Non-golfers enjoyed narrated bus tours of the city that morning and then everyone met in the afternoon at the Exhibition and Stampede Grounds that included a covered pavilion and a pioneer village. There we signed up 56 bocce players on 14 teams and proceeded to do battle for 2.5 hours. The hospitality crew moved the bar to the venue so we would not get thirsty, and Al Clark arranged for his friend Dwain Sands to sing for us through the afternoon and into the evening. We enjoyed a delicious barbeque beef dinner provided by Brian's brother followed by popular selection of local donuts including Bismarck's!

At the end of the day trophies for Golf and Bocce were presented. Additional golf winners were John Hodgson of Calgary Club with Low gross of 72 with that trophy held by Mike Wagg of Nelson for four years. Laura Young of the Calgary Club took home the Low Gross Ladies Trophy. On the Bocce courts Stampede City cleaned up. The **A side winners were Dale Green**, **Paul Stout**, **Wes Fillo** and Myrna Gerhart of Edmonton. On the **B side the winners were Dave Smith and Garry Pattison** as well as, Chuck Gerhart of Edmonton and Carol Denny of Calgary – that is 5 Stampede City prize winners of a bottle of wine each.

Hard to believe but the mobile bar was redeployed to the hotel in time for a more subdued slurry of night-caps. A 50/50 was run for the 3 days by Alan Lynas and Al Clark with over \$1000 collected.

Saturday started with the District AGM and 40 members present. The healthy bank balance led to a vote to **not have a dues fee in the budget** until next fiscal in May 2023. The budget included funds of \$1000 if our club has a deficit. An election was held with our guy **Ken Williamson approved to become Governor** and the incoming Lt. Governor is Edmonton member Dunc Mills who will be at the Curlarama. Next up was the Awards with **Fred Schute of the Edmonton Club receiving the Best Bulletin Award** and the **Stampede City Club receiving the Man Mile Award** for the highest percentage of members attending out of 8 clubs. Three clubs did not attend – Regina, Wallace and Crossroads.

Saturday noon saw everyone bussed to the Medalta Pottery Museum site where dishware, crocks etc. were produced from 1916 till 1954 that supplied 75% of Canada's stoneware. A buffet luncheon was enjoyed in a large hall followed by a presentation and tours of the museum and cooling kilns where migrant workers in the Depression were allowed to sleep until the morning when the kilns were needed. Each lady received a succulent plant and each guy received steak spices made in the Hat from our Club.

The final event of the Convention was the Gala Governor's Banquet which included:

- A Piper leading in the elected officers and spouses that included **Gyro International President Peter Carter** and wife Eileen Kuhl;
- 10 tables decorated with wheat sheeves and identified with a prominent Medicine Hat location for assigned seating with at least one Stampede City member at each table;
- A rousing rendition of O Canada led by John Cobb and Lorene Anderson;
- A unique grace provided by Paul Stout;
- The first toast to a King by a D8 Gyro since 1951 given by Dave Smith;
- A carved turkey and salmon buffet;
- A heartfelt toast to the ladies and reply by Wes and Judi Fillo;
- Installation of officers by President Carter including Ken Williamson as Governor;
- Live music during dinner and for the Ball provided by Calgary pianist and vocalist, Joel Spire;
- Winner of the 50/50 sum of \$410 was Marion Hess of Cranbrook; and
- Winner of a set of Medalta bowls was Joyce Deis of Calgary.
